Warrant Article 3: Operating Budget for School District Chester School Board Chairman Royal Richardson reviewed the 2023-24 Chester School District proposed operating budget and highlighted specific areas that represented the majority of the 4.6% increase over the prior year. These include increases in tuition at Pinkerton Academy, Chester Academy teachers' salaries, and health insurance benefits. The projected tax impact of this budget is \$1.39 per \$1,000 of assessment. He noted that details on this Warrant Article will be included in the
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64		School District Report coming out on February 24, 2023.
66		Vice Chair Dobbins explained that the Budget Committee asked the School District to limit the increase to 4.6%, as this is the projected amount that wages will increase
68		this year across the country.
