Ice at SHF

Some years it comes early, some years it comes late, but one thing that we know for sure is...ICE will come. Before a small pond can freeze over, its entire water column from top to bottom much reach the magical temperature of 39 degrees F. This natural cooling process is called "fall overturn". It is a gradual process as the surface water slowly cools until it is as dense as the bottom waters. Then, with the help of the wind, the water can be "turned over".

Most ponds and lakes don't completely freeze because ice (and eventually snow) on the surface acts to insulate the water below.



SHF FUN FACT:

How did Miss Church start her hay and sleigh rides?

In 1947 Miss Church was teaching in Chester. Her students were very interested in visiting her farm and seeing her many horses. So, she brought the children to Spring Hill Farm from the school in her hay wagon and team of horses. Soon the hay rides became very popular. When the weather became too cold for horseback riding, Miss Church hitched up a sleigh to her team of horses so her riding club, the Chester Trailriders, could go on a sleigh ride. This was the beginning of what would become a revenue producing adventure for Spring Hill Farm. In the book *IN THOSE DAYS The Life and Times of Muriel Church* as told to Ronald Baptiste, Miss Church says "So the romance of the team bells ringing and the squeaking of the runners gliding over the cold and frozen snow on zero nights seems to have taken hold."







PROGRESS in the Farmhouse!!!!!

Spring Hill Farm is edging closer and closer to receiving the final permitting which will allow the needed modifications to the farmhouse's first floor for ADA compliance. ADA compliance will allow the building to be opened up to the general public - a goal that has been in the works for a couple of years.

The project's biggest challenge is designing and constructing an ADA compliant bathroom. The bathroom renovation is taking place in the ell of the house which was constructed in 1912. This ell is an addition built off the rear of the original 1852 structure. An ell such as the one at Spring Hill Farm would have been added as a summer kitchen, additional working space, storage and possibly even a luxurious indoor privy.

In an effort to get a head start on the modifications to the farm house prior to final permitting, three volunteers donated over 40 hours of time in January. They started by dismantling the existing bathroom and pantry and hauling away the debris. (These activities did not require a permit.)

Whenever you take on a remodeling project in an old building it's almost a guarantee that you will find some construction surprises and this farmhouse was no exception. Rotted subflooring, unconventional framing techniques, makeshift materials just to name a few.

Removing the old bathroom and pantry proved to be a great place to get a head start on this project as it provided much needed insight into the existing construction details and condition of the impacted area.

As expected, the new plumbing needed for the ADA compliant bathroom will be the biggest challenge. Only a shallow crawl space exists under the new bathroom area which is also true for the entire ell. There's no nice basement that you can stand up in to do the needed plumbing work.

Opening up the farmhouse to the public in 2024 is the number one priority of the Committee and the Trust. We are going to make it happen this year!

This photo, taken at SHF by Kristina Snyder, shows the remnants of a red squirrel's pine cone snack. Although the squirrel was not in sight, this evidence is commonly seen around the base of pine trees. The squirrels chew the scales off the cones in a manner similar to a person eating corn on the cob. They begin chewing at the stem end and as each scale falls away, a pair of seeds is exposed. Repeat, repeat!
